

Madahil



Madahil - Depopulated Palestinian Village of Safad

Madahil was a small Palestinian village in the Safad Subdistrict, situated on flat ground along the northeastern edge of the al-Hula Plain approximately 30 kilometers northeast of Safad and about 100 meters above sea level.

The village lay approximately one kilometer east of Wadi Banyas and less than one kilometer south of Tall al-Turmus, a nearby archaeological mound containing evidence of settlement dating to the fourth millennium B.C.

The 1931 Census of Palestine recorded 100 inhabitants in Madahil, all Muslims, living in seventeen houses. No independently documented 1945 population or land-ownership table has been located in the principal sources used here.

Madahil's inhabitants left in late April 1948 during Operation Yiftach and the broader military offensive in eastern Galilee. Khalidi and PalQuest give 30 April as the departure date, while the Palestine Land Society register gives 29 April. The available account emphasizes fear of an impending attack or of being caught in the fighting, while also suggesting that mortar fire may have accelerated the departure.

Name

No securely documented linguistic derivation of the name Madahil was located in the principal Palestinian sources consulted.

The article therefore retains the documented village name without introducing unsupported tribal or linguistic explanations.

Location and Geography

Madahil stood on level terrain at the northeastern edge of the al-Hula Plain, approximately 30 kilometers northeast of Safad.

Wadi Banyas lay about one kilometer west of the village, while Tall al-Turmus stood less than one kilometer to the north.

Palestinian local documentation places al-Mansura to the north, Syrian territory to the east, al-Hamra' to the south, al-'Abisiyya and Qaytiyya to the southwest, Lazzaza to the west, and al-Khisas to the northwest.

Population

Madahil does not have the complete series of population statistics available for many larger villages in the Safad Subdistrict.

Number of Houses

The official 1931 census recorded **17 occupied houses** in Madahil.

No reliable official 1948 house count has been located, and no estimate is derived from population figures.

Land and Land Ownership

No sufficiently documented independent Madahil entry was located in the available 1945 land statistics from which a reliable ownership or land-use table could be constructed.

The Palestine Land Society's register likewise does not supply an independent village land area.

This article therefore does not invent land totals or divide ownership into Palestinian, Transferred to Zionists, and Public categories without an explicit documentary basis.

Economy

Madahil was a small rural community situated within the fertile agricultural environment of the al-Hula Plain. Its proximity to Wadi Banyas placed it within a well-watered landscape.

However, in the absence of an independent village land-use table, precise cereal, orchard, or grazing acreage cannot be supplied responsibly.

Later field documentation confirms that land surrounding the former village site continued to be cultivated after depopulation.

Education and Services

No independently documented school, enrollment figures, or teacher totals have been located for Madahil in the principal sources used here.

Given the small size of the community, no school, clinic, or administrative building is assumed without documentary evidence.

Religious Buildings and Cemetery

No independently documented mosque, shrine, or cemetery specific to Madahil was located in the principal sources consulted.

The fact that the 1931 population was entirely Muslim does not by itself establish the existence of a particular mosque building.

Tall al-Turmus

Tall al-Turmus stood less than one kilometer north of Madahil.

Archaeological evidence from the mound indicates settlement dating to the fourth millennium B.C.

The ancient mound should be distinguished from the modern Palestinian village.

Geographic proximity alone does not demonstrate uninterrupted settlement from the prehistoric site to twentieth-century Madahil.

Operation Yiftach

Operation Yiftach began on 15 April 1948 and continued until 25 May as part of the military campaign for eastern Galilee.

Palmach forces formed the principal striking force, and the First Battalion spearheaded important phases of the wider operation.

Madahil was depopulated during this campaign and before the final assault on Safad on 10–11 May.

Depopulation in Late April 1948

Khalidi and PalQuest date the departure of Madahil's inhabitants to 30 April 1948, while the Palestine Land Society register records 29 April.

Khalidi's account does not describe a documented ground battle inside Madahil or identify troops entering the houses on that day.

Instead, he cites later intelligence reporting that inhabitants of a number of eastern Galilee villages left during the offensive out of fear of attack.

For Madahil, fear of an impending attack or of being caught in the fighting is the principal documented explanation. Khalidi also considers it possible that Haganah mortar fire accelerated the departure.

The available account does not specify the destination to which the villagers fled.

Was Operation Matateh Responsible for Madahil's Depopulation?

Some Palestine Remembered summary fields associate both Operation Yiftach and

Operation Matateh, or “Broom,” with Madahil.

Operation Matateh was launched on **4 May 1948** and targeted Palestinian and Bedouin communities east of Safad and west of the Jordan River, including al-Zanghariyya, 'Arab al-Shamalina, and al-Tabigha.

Because the inhabitants of Madahil had already left on 29–30 April according to the principal chronology, the 4 May operation cannot have been the direct cause of their departure.

Operation Yiftach is therefore the appropriate military framework for Madahil's depopulation, while Operation Matateh belongs to the subsequent escalation across the wider Hula and Jordan Valley region.

Military Unit

Palmach forces spearheaded Operation Yiftach as a whole.

Palestine Remembered identifies the Palmach's First Battalion as the unit associated with Madahil.

Khalidi's village-specific account, however, does not independently identify a battalion that entered Madahil or describe a confirmed ground assault on the village on 30 April. The First Battalion attribution is therefore retained as a source-specific identification and broader operational context rather than as conclusively established village-level fact.

Cause of Depopulation

The most cautious formulation is that the inhabitants left because of fear of an impending military attack or of being trapped in the expanding fighting in eastern Galilee.

The source also raises the possibility that mortar fire by Haganah forces accelerated the evacuation, but does not independently establish a direct

bombardment of Madahil beyond doubt.

The village should therefore not automatically be classified as having been emptied by a documented ground assault when the available village-specific account emphasizes fear, military pressure, and possible shelling.

Destruction

All village structures had disappeared by the time of Khalidi's later field survey.

The sources used here do not establish when the buildings were demolished or whether demolition took place immediately after the inhabitants left.

The late-April depopulation date and the later disappearance of the built environment should therefore be treated as separate historical events.

Ethnic Cleansing in Source Classification

Palestine Remembered classifies Madahil using the term “complete ethnic cleansing.” The phrase is retained here only as an attributed source classification.

The directly documented facts are that the inhabitants left during Operation Yiftach under fear of attack and fighting, did not re-establish permanent residence at the village site, and that all village structures later disappeared.

Occupation and Depopulation Chronology

Date	Event
15 April 1948	Operation Yiftach begins in eastern Galilee.
Second half of April 1948	Military pressure and raids increase across eastern Galilee and the Hula region, prompting population flight from several villages.
29 April 1948	Date recorded for Madahil's depopulation in the Palestine Land Society register.

Date	Event
30 April 1948	Date used by Khalidi and PalQuest for the villagers' departure; fear of attack or of being caught in the fighting is the principal documented cause, with possible mortar fire accelerating the evacuation.
4 May 1948	Operation Matateh is launched elsewhere in the eastern Galilee-Jordan Valley area; it postdates Madahil's depopulation.
10–11 May 1948	The final assault on Safad takes place during Operation Yiftach.
After depopulation	The village structures disappear at an undetermined date.

Israeli Settlements on Madahil's Lands

According to Walid Khalidi and PalQuest, **no Israeli settlement was established on Madahil's village lands.**

Kefar Szold, founded in 1942 before the Nakba, lies approximately 1.5 kilometers southeast of the village site.

Some Palestinian local sources describe Kefar Szold as having been founded on Madahil land, but Khalidi explicitly states that it was not located on village lands. This article follows Khalidi's village-specific cadastral distinction.

Residents of Kefar Szold later cultivated land surrounding the former village site.

Madahil Today

According to the field description used by Walid Khalidi before the publication of *All That Remains* in 1992, no trace of any village structure remained at Madahil.

The site was covered with grass, reeds, and cactus, while surrounding land was cultivated by residents of Kefar Szold.

Palestine Remembered also contains later Palestinian community photographs

documenting Wadi Banyas and agricultural land around the former village area. These constitute community documentation rather than a comprehensive archaeological or cadastral survey.

Khalidi's account should therefore be understood as documented historical fieldwork from before 1992, not as a comprehensive direct survey of Madahil's condition in 2026.
