

Shahma



Shahma - Depopulated Palestinian Village of the Ramla Subdistrict

Shahma was a Palestinian village in the Ramla Subdistrict, situated on the coastal plain approximately 15 kilometers southwest of Ramla. It stood on relatively flat ground slightly higher than the terrain to its south and southeast.

The village had an average elevation of approximately 50 meters above sea level. Wadi al-Sarar passed about one kilometer southwest of the village, while a secondary road linked Shahma with the main roads leading to Ramla and the coastal highway. During the Second World War, the British constructed 'Aqir

military airfield immediately north of the village and the Shahma military camp to the north and east.

Name

Mustafa Murad al-Dabbagh suggested that the name Shahma may derive from an Aramaic/Syriac form similar to “Shahima,” associated with meanings such as dark, dusty, simple, or ordinary.

This interpretation is presented as an attributed linguistic hypothesis rather than a conclusively documented etymology.

Location

Shahma stood on the central coastal plain on relatively level ground that rose slightly above the land immediately to the south and southeast.

Wadi al-Sarar passed south and southwest of the village at a distance of approximately one kilometer, while the Wadi al-Sarar railway station lay farther to the southeast.

A secondary road connected the village with routes to Ramla and the main coastal highway.

'Aqir Airfield and Shahma Military Camp

The local landscape changed considerably during the Second World War when the British Mandate authorities constructed a military airfield known as 'Aqir immediately north of Shahma.

A separate military camp was established to the east and northeast of the village.

These military installations became a major feature of Shahma's immediate surroundings before the Nakba. After 1948, the former Palestinian village site itself was incorporated into a fenced military airfield.

Shahma in the Nineteenth Century

Nineteenth-century travelers and surveyors described Shahma as a small village.

The Survey of Western Palestine characterized it as a small adobe-built village whose inhabitants obtained water from a well south of the settlement.

Earlier visitors also reported ancient remains and pools at the site, helping explain why stones from older structures were later reused in some village houses.

Built Environment

The Mandate-era Palestine Index Gazetteer classified Shahma as a hamlet or small agricultural locality.

The village was divided into northern and southern sections by the secondary road passing through it.

Most houses were built of adobe, while some incorporated stone from earlier structures on the site.

The built-up area in 1945 covered approximately **11 dunums**.

Population in 1922 and the Source Discrepancy

Later Palestinian sources do not agree on Shahma's 1922 population, with figures of 80 and 87 appearing in different compilations.

The source citing J. B. Barron's official *Census of Palestine, 1922*, however, gives **107 inhabitants**, all Muslims.

This article therefore uses 107 as the figure closest to the official census while explicitly noting the discrepancy in secondary literature.

Population in 1931

All of Shahma's inhabitants recorded in 1931 were Muslims.

Population in 1944/1945

The official 1944/45 statistics recorded **280 Arab Palestinian inhabitants** in Shahma.

This reflects substantial population growth during the Mandate period.

Estimated Population in 1948

Later Palestinian registers give approximately **325 inhabitants** for Shahma in 1948, while some databases round the figure to around 330.

The 325 figure is a retrospective estimate and should not be described as an official census conducted in 1948.

Land Ownership in 1945

Shahma's registered land area totaled **6,875 dunums**.

The official Mandate table uses the categories Arab, Jewish, and Public: 5,165 Arab dunums, 220 Jewish dunums, and 1,490 public dunums.

Approximately 96 percent of Shahma's land was classified as cultivable or cultivated in the 1945 statistics.

Correction to the Cereal-Land Figure

Some later Palestinian databases list 6,200 dunums as Palestinian cereal land.

The official table instead separates cereal land into:

- 4,911 Arab/Palestinian dunums.
- 220 Jewish dunums.
- 1,289 public dunums.

The correct total cereal area is therefore 6,420 dunums.

Olive Cultivation

The Palestinian Encyclopedia reports approximately **40 dunums of olive cultivation in 1943**.

The official 1945 land-use table does not provide olive land as an additional independent category. The 40 dunums are therefore not added on top of the 6,605 dunums of cultivable land, avoiding double counting.

Economic Life

Agriculture formed the basis of Shahma's economy, especially cereal cultivation.

Citrus, orchards, irrigated plots, and livestock raising also contributed to village livelihoods.

Oral accounts from villagers additionally recall crops such as lentils, sesame, vegetables, fodder crops, wheat, and barley.

Water

Shahma had no major natural springs and depended on wells for drinking water and household use.

Nineteenth-century descriptions specifically mention a well south of the village from which residents obtained water.

Education and Services

The principal sources reviewed do not document an independent school or health facility inside Shahma.

No educational or medical institution is therefore attributed to the village without direct evidence.

Village Families

Local oral-history and community records name several Shahma families, including Hasan, al-Qrinawi, 'Awad, Khadr, Katkat, al-Mudhakkir, Shahin, Abu Haniyya, al-Mahshi, al-Hattawi, al-Yakhri, and al-Ra'i.

This is community documentation rather than an official population register.

Occupation and Depopulation

Several Palestinian sources give **14 May 1948** as Shahma's depopulation date.

The village lay within the zone of the Giv'ati Brigade's advance during Operation Barak, which targeted Palestinian localities south and west of Ramla and across the southern coastal plain.

Palestine Remembered associates Shahma with the Giv'ati Brigade and Operation Barak.

Its depopulation cause is classified as the **influence of the fall or evacuation of a neighboring Palestinian locality**, meaning that the available sources do not necessarily establish a separate detailed battle inside Shahma itself.

Operation Barak

Operation Barak was launched by the Haganah's Giv'ati Brigade in May 1948 to expand control over the coastal region south and west of Ramla before the end of

the British Mandate.

PalQuest dates its principal first stage to 9–13 May and describes a subsequent continuation of the offensive as British forces withdrew.

Because Shahma's recorded depopulation date is 14 May, it falls within the immediate continuation of the Barak campaign. This explains why some village compilations describe Shahma as part of the “first stage” even though the formal operation chronology places 14 May immediately after its initial phase.

Military Unit

The military unit associated with Shahma's depopulation was the Giv'ati Brigade.

Giv'ati was the principal force operating on the Ramla and coastal-plain axis during Operation Barak, while the Negev Brigade participated elsewhere in the wider campaign.

Occupation and Displacement Chronology

Pre-Nakba Village	Until spring 1948	A small agricultural village with 280 inhabitants in 1944/45 and extensive cereal and citrus cultivation.

End of the Formal First Phase	13 May 1948	Military pressure continued as the British Mandate approached its final day.

Cause of Displacement

The principal sources do not provide a detailed account of a separate major assault fought inside Shahma itself.

The village's depopulation is classified as resulting from the **influence of the fall or evacuation of a nearby Palestinian locality**.

At the same time, Shahma lay directly within the zone of Giv'ati military operations during Operation Barak.

The most accurate formulation is therefore: **the inhabitants left under the pressure of military operations, the Giv'ati advance, and the fall or evacuation of neighboring Palestinian communities during Operation Barak**.

Extent of Destruction

Shahma ceased to exist as a Palestinian built-up village after the Nakba.

Palestinian sources describe the village as destroyed, but no reliable numerical percentage of destruction is documented.

The location was subsequently incorporated into a fenced military area, limiting direct access to the former village site.

Israeli Settlements on Shahma Land

According to Walid Khalidi and PalQuest, **no Israeli settlement was established on Shahma's village lands**.

An older Palestinian Encyclopedia entry gives a different account, stating that Kidron, founded in 1949, was located on land associated with both Shahma and Qatra.

More specific documentation for Qatra, however, identifies Kidron as established on Qatra land.

This article therefore does not list Kidron as a confirmed settlement on Shahma land and preserves the source disagreement rather than resolving it without cadastral evidence.

Shahma Today

Walid Khalidi's historical field description records that Shahma's site was incorporated into a **fenced military airfield**.

Cactuses, thorny vegetation, and bushes were visible from outside the fenced area, while the Palestinian village itself no longer survived as an independent built-up locality.

This description comes from historical field research incorporated into *All That Remains* and should not be treated as direct field verification of conditions in 2026.
