

Al-Butaymat



Al-Butaymat - Depopulated Palestinian Village of the Haifa Subdistrict

Al-Butaymat was a depopulated Palestinian village in the Haifa Subdistrict, located approximately 31 kilometers southeast of Haifa. It stood at an average elevation of about 200 meters above sea level in the hilly region of Bilad al-Rawha'.

The village was built on the slope of a small wadi. Its narrow built-up area extended generally from east to west and became progressively narrower toward the west. Several springs around the site provided water, while agriculture and livestock raising formed the main basis of the village economy.

The Name Al-Butaymat and Bilad al-Rawha'

The name al-Butaymat is associated with the butm or terebinth tree, a species familiar in Palestine and the Levant. The village stood in the heart of the wider hilly region known as Bilad al-Rawha'.

The Palestine Index Gazetteer published during the British Mandate classified al-Butaymat as a hamlet, reflecting the relatively small size of its built-up settlement.

Location and Built Environment

Al-Butaymat stood on the slope of a small wadi in a generally hilly landscape. Its

built-up area formed a narrow strip extending from east to west and narrowing toward the west.

The houses were constructed of stone joined with either mud or cement mortar. Despite the village's small size, its Muslim inhabitants maintained their own mosque.

Population of Al-Butaymat

The inhabitants of al-Butaymat were Muslims. The official censuses show a modest decline in population between 1922 and 1931, followed by a population of approximately 110 in the mid-1940s.

Land Ownership in Al-Butaymat

The total land area of al-Butaymat amounted to 8,557 dunums in the 1944/45 statistics. Palestine Remembered presents the simplified ownership categories as

The official 1944/45 Village Statistics use the categories Arab, Jewish, and Public, listing 3,832 Arab dunums, 4,724 Jewish dunums, and one public dunum, for the same total of 8,557 dunums.

Cultivated or cultivable land therefore amounted to 7,239 dunums, approximately 85 percent of the total village area, while built-up and non-cultivable land together amounted to 1,318 dunums.

Palestine Remembered separately displays a figure of 113 dunums planted with olives. This figure is not added to the official 1944/45 land-use table because that table already accounts for the entire 8,557 dunums without a separate olive category; adding it would therefore risk double counting.

Economic Life in Al-Butaymat

The villagers depended primarily on agriculture and livestock raising. Cereals constituted the main crop by area: 2,508 dunums of Arab-classified land were allocated to cereals in 1944/45.

A further 8 dunums of Arab-classified land were irrigated or used for orchards. Livestock breeding was another important component of the local rural economy.

Water Resources

Several springs surrounded the village site and supplied the inhabitants with water for domestic and agricultural purposes. These springs were among the most important natural features of the village's location in Bilad al-Rawha'.

Education in Al-Butaymat

The principal sources reviewed for this article do not provide sufficiently documented information about an independent school in al-Butaymat, its establishment date, or enrollment. No unsupported school date or student figure is therefore supplied.

The Mosque and Religious Life

The residents of al-Butaymat were Muslims, and despite the small size of the village they maintained their own mosque.

Occupation and Depopulation of Al-Butaymat

The occupation of al-Butaymat was associated with the Battle of Mishmar HaEmek and the Haganah counteroffensive against surrounding Palestinian villages in April 1948.

The battle began on 4 April when the Arab Liberation Army attacked Mishmar

HaEmek. After the offensive stalled, Haganah commanders rejected a proposed truce and decided instead to extend their counterattack into the surrounding Palestinian villages.

On the night of 8–9 April, Haganah forces began capturing villages around Mishmar HaEmek. Historical material reproduced by Walid Khalidi identifies forces involved during the wider fighting as including the First Battalion of the Palmach and units from the Carmeli and Alexandroni brigades. By 14 April, approximately ten villages had fallen to Haganah forces.

PalQuest's entry on neighboring al-Rihaniyya, citing a contemporary press report, states that **al-Rihaniyya, Daliyat al-Rawha', and al-Butaymat were occupied together on 14 April 1948**. This provides the strongest documented date for the occupation of the al-Butaymat site.

Palestine Remembered separately displays **1 May 1948** in its summary field and describes the cause of departure as fear of attack or fear of becoming caught up in the fighting. Its detailed historical text does not independently establish 1 May as the actual date of occupation.

Battle of Mishmar HaEmek and Military Unit

Military Context: The Haganah counteroffensive following the Battle of Mishmar HaEmek in April 1948.

Military Unit: The principal sources do not identify the exact force that entered al-Butaymat at the village level. Units participating in the wider fighting around Mishmar HaEmek included the First Battalion of the Palmach and forces from the Carmeli and Alexandroni brigades.

Palestine Remembered lists the Irgun as the “most likely” attacking force in a summary field. This attribution is not independently supported by a village-specific historical account, however, and is therefore not presented here as a confirmed identification.

Cause of Depopulation

The principal historical sources do not provide a detailed independent account of the exact moment in which all residents left al-Butaymat. Palestine Remembered classifies the cause as fear of attack or fear of being caught in the fighting.

The historical chronology places the village's depopulation within the collapse of Palestinian villages around Mishmar HaEmek during the April 1948 military offensive. The cause is therefore presented with appropriate caution rather than converted into a more specific claim unsupported by the sources.

Destruction of Al-Butaymat

The principal sources do not establish a precise date for the destruction of al-Butaymat following its occupation. Later field documentation nevertheless indicates that the village's houses had virtually disappeared, leaving only scattered adobe bricks.

Settlements on Al-Butaymat Village Lands

Even Yitzhaq, also known as **Gal'ed**, was established in 1945 on al-Butaymat village lands west of the village site. It was therefore founded before the Nakba on part of the village's territory.

In July 1948, **Regavim** was initially established near al-Butaymat. This location was temporary: the settlement was transferred in 1949 to the lands of the depopulated village of Qannir. Regavim should therefore be described as a temporary post-occupation settlement associated with the al-Butaymat site rather than as a permanent settlement remaining on its lands.

Al-Butaymat Today

According to the field documentation used by Walid Khalidi, the village site was fenced and covered with grass and cactus. No identifiable houses remained, apart from scattered adobe bricks across the site.

Most of the surrounding land was being used as pasture, while some sections remained under cultivation.

PalQuest publishes a photograph of the site dated September 1987. This description therefore reflects historical field documentation from the period preceding the publication of *All That Remains* in 1992 and should not be treated as a direct field verification of conditions in 2026.
