

Al-Maliha



Subdistrict: Jerusalem

Estimated population in 1948: approximately 2,250

Date of occupation and depopulation: 14 July 1948; fighting and counterattacks continued
until 16 July

Military units: A company of the Irgun Zvai Leumi (IZL/Etzel) and two platoons of the Gadna's
Yonatan Company

Israeli settlements established on al-Maliha's lands before 1948: None

Village land on the Israeli-held side of the 1949 Armistice Line: approximately 6,256 dunams, according to later Palestinian village compilations

Israeli development on and around the village site after 1948: Manahat was established on the site in 1949. Later Jerusalem neighbourhoods developed on or around former village lands include Ramat Daniya, Ir Ganim, Givat Massua, parts of Gonen (the Katamonim), and Givat Mordechai; the precise boundaries attributed to each neighbourhood vary between secondary sources.

Al-Maliha was a Palestinian village situated southwest of Jerusalem. Its residents were displaced in 1948, and the village was gradually absorbed into the expanding urban area of Jerusalem. It stood approximately 5.5 kilometres from the city.

Information about al-Maliha

- Al-Maliha stood on a high mountain slope. Bayt Safafa and the Qatamon area lay to the east; Ayn Karim and al-Jura to the west; the lands of Lifta and Deir Yasin to the north; and the lands of Bayt Jala and Sharafat to the south.
- The village was approximately 5.5 kilometres southwest of Jerusalem.
- Al-Maliha stood on a plateau overlooking a wide area in every direction except the north. A newer section was constructed on the southeastern slope of a neighbouring hill. A short secondary road connected the village to the main road leading to Jerusalem, while other secondary roads and dirt tracks linked it with neighbouring villages.
- The village had a rectangular plan.
- Most houses were constructed of stone, and the population was predominantly Muslim. In 1945, the official total was 1,940 residents: 1,930 Muslims and 10 Christians.

Economic Life in al-Maliha

Most residents depended on rainfed agriculture and livestock raising, while others worked in crafts, commerce, and services. Village lands produced cereals, vegetables, and fruit. In 1944/45, 1,013 dunams of Palestinian-owned land were devoted to cereal cultivation, while 2,613 dunams were irrigated or used for orchards, including 1,370 dunams planted with olive trees. Wild vegetation covered the neighbouring mountain slopes, which were used for grazing.

Public Facilities in al-Maliha

Al-Maliha had the following public institutions:

- A government elementary school.
- A medical clinic.
- A large mosque named after Umar ibn al-Khattab, the second caliph.
- A small number of shops and a village council.

Archaeological Remains in al-Maliha

Numerous rock-cut tombs were found in and around the village, and a ruined tower stood near the mosque. These remains, together with other archaeological evidence at the site, indicate that the area had been inhabited since antiquity.

Occupation and Depopulation of al-Maliha

A report published by the Jaffa-based Palestinian newspaper *Filastin* dated the first recorded attack on al-Maliha to 6 March 1948, when a Jewish unit entered the village outskirts and clashed with its defenders. Israeli historian Benny Morris describes the evacuation as occurring in two stages. The first wave took place in April following the massacre in neighbouring Deir Yasin on 9 April.

Al-Maliha was not completely depopulated until mid-July, when it came under direct attack after the first truce. On the night of 13–14 July, a company of the Irgun Zvai Leumi and two platoons of the Gadna's Yonatan Company entered the village and established positions there. Arab forces counterattacked on 15 July and temporarily forced the Irgun to withdraw from its most advanced position, but Israeli reinforcements retook it. Further fighting continued on 16 July, after which al-Maliha remained under Israeli control. Sources commonly use 14 July as the occupation and depopulation date, although the battle extended over several days.

Israeli Development on al-Maliha's Lands

The Israeli suburb of Manahat was established on the village site in 1949. The site was later incorporated into Jerusalem's expanding southern and southwestern urban area. PalQuest specifically notes that parts of the Ramat Daniya neighbourhood surround the village on the west and north. Other Palestinian compilations also attribute areas occupied by Ir Ganim, Givat Massua, Gonen, and Givat Mordechai to al-Maliha's former lands; exact boundary attributions vary between sources.

Al-Maliha Today

Many of the village houses remain standing and are occupied by Jewish families, although several houses in the southern part of the village were demolished. The inhabited limestone houses are generally two-storey structures with arched doors and windows; some have balconies whose roofs are supported by columns and rounded arches. The mosque and its tall, round minaret remain in the village centre, while the former school building has been abandoned. The village cemetery survives on the southern edge of the site, and orchards grow on the southern and southeastern slopes and in the valleys.
